Every year the University of Melbourne invites a selection of secondary school principals to the university. It is an opportunity for the university to share with us their strategic direction, as well as an opportunity to discuss our students and the tertiary admission process.

This year was unique in that we had the opportunity to listen to Glyn Davis deliver what amounted to his retirement speech. In this speech he ruminated about his 14 years as vice-chancellor and on what he has learnt about educational leadership. It was a reflective, frank, and highly personal view of both the challenges and rewards of this role.

His first point was that as an educational

leader one has to “look after the institution we care about”, and make intelligent decisions that will leave things in a better place than when one arrived. He emphasised the importance of having vision, values, clarity, and the ability to communicate. The thing that matters, according to Glyn, is to have one’s strategy and priorities in place so that there is a clear sense of purpose in the work that we do. This is very relevant to Albert Park College as we are undertaking a review of our strategic direction in term four. He talked about the importance of symbols, as statements of who you are and what you stand for. At Albert Park College I think a good example of a symbol is our commitment to the Annual Art



Show that speaks to our passion for the arts and creativity.

Glyn highlighted the importance of doing something distinctive and different, so that your institution develops its own sense of identity. I like to think that the development of the Albert Park College education precinct is something that certainly distinguishes us from other schools.

He reminded us that as an educational leader you are simply a figurehead. Someone has to be the figurehead, and someone else will be when you leave. He argued passionately about never listening to praise or gossip. The job is to treat everyone equally and focus on recognising others. He talked about the “loneliness of command, the price of the leadership you so eagerly sought.” It does not last, so treasure it and enjoy it. It is an extraordinary joy and privilege to lead.

The thing I enjoyed most about his speech was his ability to remind all educational leaders that this job is an important one. We have the joy of helping to shape the next generation and it is fun, challenging and an honor to be part of. By the next morning, we were used to waking up early and we were pumped and ready to go. We gobbled down breakfast and in a flash we were





## Yr 11 Outdoor & Environmental Studies Cross Country Skiing Journey




On Monday 19th of August the Year 11 Outdoor & Environmental Studies class visited the only Victorian alpine resort with a largely undeveloped and unspoilt true alpine summit, Mt Stirling. Students arrived to the semi-wilderness environment to mountains of snow and steller conditions for a 3-day snow-based Journey.

The class had a number of Cross Country Skiing lessons and then embarked on a journey with their backpacks up the mountain. The class had the opportunity to camp for 2 nights at the Alpine Camp and enjoy a group fire in the communal Teepee. A totally self sufficient-camp, students developed knowledge of Victoria's alpine environment, got a first hand look at the threats to the flora and fauna (including the pesky Broad Toothed Rat), and gained invaluable knowledge on the skills needed to participate safely in a remote alpine environment.

Thanks to Mr Howard, Ms Barton, Mr Hedstrom and Ms Chang for accompanying us to Hotham, we all had a lot of fun!




